

Audio Description Performance, The Last Sunday of each production with On-Stage Pre-Show, Actor Voice ID, and Touch Tour at 1:30, Audio Pre-Show at 2:15 and Performance at 2:30PM

Audio Description (or AD) helps to make visual imagery accessible to people who are blind or visually impaired. Visual elements can include costumes, sets, and character appearances, along with action, gestures, facial expressions, and other visually important images. It's used to enhance understanding and enjoyment of live performance.

This equipment was made available to the community thanks to the Greater Pittsburgh Arts Council through a grant from the Allegheny Regional Asset District.

Real Time Live Caption Performance, The Last Sunday of each production at 2:30

Anna Cillo of Advanced Realtime Captioning Solutions will provide our patrons with real-time live captions for patrons who are deaf or hard of hearing.

Sensory Inclusive Performance, The Last Saturday of each production at 2:30PM

Our performances are designed as a family experience. We offer a quiet area and our patrons have access to Sensory bags designed to assist the needs of adults and children. The bags are filled with items that may help lessen sensory overload and engage. The bag items are also easily cleaned and sterilized for multiple uses.

Anna Cillo, Realtime Captioner

Advanced Realtime Captioning Solutions is owned and operated by Anna Cillo, who has been providing captions and real-time court reporting in western Pennsylvania and the surrounding states since 2009. Anna Cillo is a member of the NCRA, the Association of Court Reporters and Captioners, and a graduate of CCAC. She worked as the staff captioner for the Pittsburgh Pirates from 2014-2022 and has provided captions for the Pittsburgh Chapter of the Hearing Loss Association throughout her career. Advanced Realtime Captioning Solutions was founded in 2018 in response to the demand for captioning in and around the City of Pittsburgh. We have provided captions and consulting to many organizations and individuals within the City of Pittsburgh and the surrounding areas. Some organizations we have worked with include Carnegie Mellon University, The Pittsburgh Cultural Trust, The Pittsburgh Symphony Orchestra, Duquesne University, City Theater, The Children's Museum of Pittsburgh, Temple Sinai, The Heinz History Center, and have been working with the Center for Hearing and Deaf Services for many years.

Nathan Ruggles, Audio Describer

Nathan has provided Audio Description (AD) services for Prime Stage patrons who are blind and visually impaired since 2017. Together they received the 2022 Award for Achievement in Audio Description for Theater from The American Council of the Blind (ACB). Founder and Principal of Audio Describe Pittsburgh!, he provides AD for the Pittsburgh Cultural Trust Broadway Series and Pittsburgh CLO, and serves theaters and venues in the greater Pittsburgh area and beyond. He has also worked with organizations such as Film Pittsburgh, the Children's Museum, Andy Warhol Museum, Greater Pittsburgh Arts Council, and the Pennsylvania Council on the Arts. He has trained through the Audio Description Institute, Audio Description Access, Audio Description Coalition, VSA Pennsylvania, and the Kennedy Center Leadership Exchange in Arts and Disability (LEAD). Beyond writing and narration, he furnishes comprehensive services that include recording, consulting, and technical support, bringing his unique background in professional stage acting, voice over, broadcast radio, podcast production, arts administration, political advocacy, and radio reading services.



Wayne Brinda, Ed.D. (Director)

Wayne is Co-founder/Producing Artistic Director of Prime Stage where he directed *The Miracle Worker, Treasure Island, The Outsiders, Twelve Angry Men, Diary of Anne Frank*, as well as the world premieres of *The Music Lesson, and Clemente: The Measure of a Man.* As Producer, Prime Stage has commissioned several world premieres, such as *The Music Lesson, Wade in the Water, Clemente: The Measure of the Man, The Josh Gibson Story, The Westing Game, Perks of Being a Wallflower*, and *Perseverance.* Locally, Wayne has directed for Red Barn Players, Apple Hill Playhouse, Duquesne University Red Masquers, Penn State Thespian, Little Lake Theatre, Red Barn Theatre in Allison Park, and South Park Theatre, and was the Director of the Playhouse Jr. As a Museum Teaching Fellow of the US Holocaust Memorial Museum in Washington DC, Wayne produces theatre productions on the Holocaust and conducts presentations on using literature and

theatre to teach the Holocaust. He has delivered presentations on adolescent literacy and Holocaust education at Jagiellonian University in Krakow, Poland, as well as the National Council of Teachers of English, The Association for Middle-Level Education, the American Alliance for Theatre and Education, the International Reading Association 21st World Congress on Reading in Budapest, Hungary, and others.

OPENING NIGHT POST-SHOW DISCUSSION WITH PATTY PARTINGTON

Patty is the daughter of WWII veteran Guy Prestia. She worked for 42 years at Ellwood City Hospital as a unit secretary and patient care tech. She has one daughter, Chelsea. Patty volunteered to be her father's secretary - she helped arrange speaking engagements and interviews and accompanied him to Army reunions. Now retired, she enjoys reading, picture puzzles, and refinishing furniture.

WORLD WAR II AND THE LIBERATION OF THE CONCENTRATION CAMPS

Guy Prestia Sgt US Army 157th Infantry Regiment 45th Infantry Division. Liberation of Dachau Concentration Camp April 29, 1945. For over 25 years he spoke to schools, rotary clubs, churches, and anyone who would listen to him about WWII and the horrors of the Holocaust. We must never forget!




One of the most profound experiences in Prestia's military career was the liberation of the Dachau concentration camp in Germany. As part of the 45th Division, Prestia was among the first Allied soldiers to enter the camp, where they were confronted with the horrifying evidence of the Holocaust. The soldiers found over 31,000 surviving prisoners and thousands of dead bodies, a scene that deeply affected Prestia and his comrades. The liberation of Dachau was a turning point for many soldiers, who, up until that moment, had not fully understood the atrocities committed by the Nazis. For Prestia, this experience underscored the importance of the war and the fight against tyranny.










DRAMATURG'S NOTES

There is nothing within our collective consciousness that can compare to the brutality and inhumanity that was the Holocaust. And within the events of the Holocaust itself, there is little more upsetting than the evils committed against the very young.

This play is based on the true story of Friedl Dicker-Brandeis, an artist and educator who secretly taught many of the children sent to Terezín, a transit camp in what is now the Czech Republic. Bringing her own art supplies instead of extra clothing or other personal belongings, she helped her students process their feelings and reactions to the world around them, transferring their emotions into paintings, poems, and chalk drawings.

It is because of Ms. Dicker-Brandeis' foresight that we know the identities of many of the children who did not survive the camps. She insisted that each child sign his or her name on each piece of art, then safely hid upwards of five thousand individual pieces. Despite the Nazis' frantic attempts to burn all the proof of their cruelty at Terezín, we have precious insight into the lives of the children there, all because of a teacher's love.

As you watch this powerful and poignant play, please remember that it is not fiction. We remember the Holocaust not only to honor its many victims and survivors but to remind ourselves that none of us has the right to turn a blind eye. None of us can assume that someone else will take action.

We are the ones responsible for ensuring that nothing like this ever happens again.



The biography of Leon Leyson, the only memoir published by a former Schindler's List child.

Number the Stars by Lois Lowry

In 1943, during the German occupation of Denmark, ten-year-old Annemarie learns how to be brave and courageous when she helps shelter her Jewish friend from the Nazis.

White Bird by R.J. Palacio (graphic novel)

This volume tells the story of a Jewish girl who was hidden by a family in a Nazi-occupied French village during WWII and how the boy she once shunned became her savior and best friend.

The Promise: A Story of Two Sisters, Prisoners in a Nazy Concentration Camp by Pnina Bat-Zvi

A true story about how two brave sisters whose promise to their parents to always stay together helped them survive Auschwitz.

Hana's Suitcase by Karen Levine

A biography of a Czech girl who died in the Holocaust, told in alternating chapters with an account of how the curator of a Japanese Holocaust center learned about her life after Hana's suitcase was sent to her.

Teen Books:

Somewhere There Is Still a Sun by Michael Gruenbaum

When the Nazis invade Czechoslovakia in 1941, twelve-year-old Michael and his family are deported from Prague to the Terezín concentration camp, where his mother's will and ingenuity keep them from being transported Auschwitz and certain death.

Requiem by Paul B. Janeczko

Presents a collection of poetry inspired by the history of the people in the Terezín concentration camp during the holocaust.

What the Night Sings by Vesper Stamper

After being liberated from the concentration camps, Gerta tries to make a new life for herself, aided by Lev, a fellow survivor.

Prisoner B-3087 by Alan Gratz

Based on the life of Jack Gruener, this book relates his story of survival from the Nazi occupation of Krakow, when he was eleven, through a succession of concentration camps, to the final liberation of Dachau.

They Went Left by Monica Hesse

Zofia, a teenage Holocaust survivor, travels across post-war Europe as she searches for her younger brother and seeks to rebuild her shattered life.

The Book Thief by Markus Zusak

Trying to make sense of the horrors of WWII, Death relates the story of Liesel—a young German girl whose book-stealing and story-telling talents help sustain her family and the Jewish man they are hiding.

Survivor's Club: The True Story of a Very Young Prisoner of Auschwitz by Michael Bornstein

Tells the story of how a father's courageous wit, a mother's fierce love, and one perfectly timed illness saved Michael's life, and how others in his family from Zarki, Poland dodged death at the hands of the Nazis time and again with incredible deftness.

We are Witnesses: Five Teenagers Who Died in the Holocaust by Jacob Boas

Diary entries written by five Holocaust victims document ordeals suffered in Nazi-occupied Lithuania, Hungary, Belgium, and Holland.

Man's Search for Meaning by Viktor Frankl

A timeless examination of life in the Nazi death camps, adapted for young adult readers.

<u>Adult</u>

Let's Make Things Better by Gidon Lev

One Holocaust survivor's message of hope and celebration of life. After decades of silence, Gidon has retold his story of being imprisoned in Theresienstadt concentration camp from age six for nearly four years. Gidon's life is extraordinary not only because he is one of the few living survivors, but because of his lessons learned over nearly a century.

A Sparrow in Terezín by Kristy Cambron

The Nazi regime claimed Terezín was a model camp, but when one London reporter lands behind its walls, she uncovers the horrors of this concentration camp that often served as a stop on the road to Auschwitz.

Triumph of Hope by Ruth Elias

A first-person account of how a young Jewish woman from Czechoslovakia survived internment by the Nazis in the death camps of Terezín and Auschwitz during WW II.

SUGGESTED READING LIST

A Century of Wisdom by Caroline Stoessinger

Before her death at 110, the pianist Alice Herz-Sommer has seen it all, surviving the Theresienstadt concentration camp, attending the trial of Adolf Eichmann in Jerusalem, and along the way encountering some of the most fascinating historical figures of our time. Her story is a testament to the bonds of friendship, the power of music, and the importance of leading a life of material simplicity, intellectual curiosity, and neverending optimism.

Last Days of Theresienstadt by Eva Noack-Mosse

In February of 1945, during the final months of the Third Reich, Eva was deported to the Nazi concentration camp of Theresienstadt. A trained journalist and expert typist, she was put to work in the Central Evidence office of the camp, compiling endless lists and all the obsessive details required by the SS. With access to camp records, she also recorded statistics and her own observations in a secret diary.

Borrowed Time by Dennis Carlyle Darling

In 2012, Darling began photographing and interviewing the aging and rapidly vanishing population of Holocaust survivors who spent time at the German transit camp and ghetto located at Terezín, a former eighteenth-century military garrison located north of Prague.

In Memory's Kitchen: A Legacy from the Women of Terezín

A beautiful memorial to the brave women who defied Hitler by preserving a part of their heritage and a part of themselves in this handwritten collection of recipes, proving that the Nazis could not break the spirit of the Jewish people.

The Girls of Room 28 by Hannelore Brenner-Wonschick

From 1942 to 1944, twelve thousand children passed through the Theresienstadt internment camp, near Prague, on their way to Auschwitz. Only a few hundred of them survived the war. Ten of these children tell us how they did it.

Night by Elie Wiesel

Born in the town of Sighet, Transylvania, Wiesel was a teenager when he and his family were deported to Auschwitz and then Buchenwald. *Night* is the shattering record of his memories of the death of his family and his own innocence.

Check Out These Films...

The Last Butterfly (2005)

In the tiny Czech village of Terezín, the Nazis plan a propaganda coup to reshape international opinion. In order to reassure a Red Cross delegation and to show the caring face of Nazism, Hitler has given the village to Jewish settlers as a place where they can live in freedom. (Rated R)

Defiant Requiem (2012)

A memorial concert reawakens the story of an artistic uprising in the Nazi concentration camp, Terezín, where a chorus of 150 inmates confronts the Nazis face-to-face and sings to them what they dare not say. (Rated N/A)

The Number on Great-grandpa's Arm (2017)

This short documentary looks at the relationship between an inquisitive American boy and his great-grandfather, a Polish-born Jew who lost both his parents to the Nazis but was able to survive Auschwitz and make his way to America. (Rated TV-PG)




